Learning enquiries: 1). French Society, Why were people so unhappy? 2). What were the consequences of Louis XVI's actions at the Estates General? 3). The events of the French Revolution up to July 1791 4). What were the consequences for the King and Queen? 5). Significantly improved' how far do you agree with this interpretation of life for the third estate after the revolution? 6). What caused the rise of Napoleon to power?

The most significant consequence of the Slave Sale was the knowledge that they would never see their home again. To what extent do you agree? 5). 'Slave rebellions were not successful' To what extent do you agree? 6). Why was the Slave Trade abolished? 7). What were the consequences of the abolition of the slave trade? 8). Write a narrative account of Martin Luther King's role in the Civil Rights Movement.
